60 ECTS credits from semesters 1-2 and 30 ECTS credits from semesters 3-4 completed in the Law programme at Karlstad University (JALAW), or equivalent

Learning Outcomes

Knowledge and understanding

Upon completion of the course, students should be able to:

- give an account of the child rights perspective and its regulation in Swedish and international legislation,
- give an account of children's legal status in a number of areas covered previously in the programme,
- give an account of legislation that is relevant for the child welfare work of the social services, and
- give an account of relevant concepts in the area and different perspectives on children and children's law.

Competence and skills

Upon completion of the course, students should be able to:

- identify and solve administrative law problems related to the area of children's law,
- identify and analyse administrative law problems and propose well supported and justified solutions,
- analyse the legal position of children in relation to their parents and to society at large, and
- identify the particular difficulties involved when considering the legal framework of children's law from the perspective of an underage person.

Judgement and approach

Upon completion of the course, students should be able to:

- analyse children's law regulations in principle and from ideological perspectives,
- discuss the regulation de lege ferenda in a constructive way,
- use the legal sources of children's law when applying the law to various professional areas directly or indirectly related to children, and
- analyse and critically evaluate knowledge in the area of children's law on the basis of different theoretical perspectives.

Content

The course aims to provide in-depth knowledge of children's legal relations in families and in society, both in terms of Swedish law and in terms of international law. Key concepts of children's law such as the best interest of the child, the child's right to be heard, and the wishes of the child are explored. The course covers for instance issues related to children's rights to parents and family, children's rights to care and welfare, and (briefly) children's rights to economic maintenance. The responsibility of society for children's welfare and education is discussed, for instance in relation to the way in which society treats young offenders. The course also covers rules concerning children's ability to act legally, for instance in matters regarding the child as a patient, the child as a consumer, and the child as a party in other types of contracts. The legal sources of children's law are studied, as well as the need for crossdisciplinary knowledge and various considerations related to the legal position of the child in relation to parents and society at large.

Examination

Assessment is based on individual proposals presented and discussed in mandatory seminars, and a written exam.
